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A Rector's EU Muse or Maze

It is often said that you shouldn't mix Religion with Politics! Of course I disagree, for both are about our belief systems, and what we believe influences and shapes policy and the communities we live in and serve.

As Rector I will not tell you which way to vote for that is your right and hopefully your own conscious decision. However, as a Christian wanting to seek and know God's will I often do wonder what is the Christian response to this or that debate. The current debate on the European Union again flags up the difficulty or struggle we sometimes have in responding to what in effect actually maybe a decision between two good possibilities rather than a clear right or wrong situation.

One of the key areas of discussion is about "Sovereignty", however for the Christian we need to remember that our hope and trust is in a sovereign God. If we accept that God's power is universal then our starting concept of sovereignty should be one that transcends national borders. All other sovereignties exist under, and are subject to, the divine sovereignty Jesus Christ. One day every knee will bow.

But when should nations or individuals surrender a degree of self-determination in order to cooperate? And when should they preserve their individuality in order to meet their own needs more acutely? Certain passages within the Bible suggest that God wants us to live together in unity but our individual diversity is also valued, as we read in 1 Corinthians 12:19, "If all were a single member, where would the body be?" There are no easy answers so let us to pray, reflect and vote seeking that God's will be known. The prayer below maybe useful

Loving God, In the referendum that lies before us, in the challenge of seeking an answer, in our differences of opinion, in our need to understand, may you guide us in our decisions, make us gracious in our disagreement, and may we join you to work for the building of your kingdom rather than our own. Amen

We are called to be people of the Sovereign King and ambassadors of the Kingdom. That means thoughtfully praying over issues and engaging with the community around us, whom we are called to love and serve in Christ name.

TWIDDLEMUFFS/ FOOTERMUFFS

Muffs may be a thing of the past but the older generation remember them as effective hand warmers for those snowy days and they were a great fashion accessory too!

A Twiddlemuff (or footermuff as Peter calls them to give them a Scottish twiddle) is a simple muff but with bits and bobs added e.g. buttons, bells, wool, lace, nuts and bolts, zips, ribbons, beads etc.

It has been found that many people with dementia like to twiddle or footer with their hands, touching and stroking material, fastening and unfastening zips and buttons etc. Having a Footermuff offers individuals a safe option to footer with. The muff helps calm them down and can keep them occupied for a while. People like the feel and sight of them, and so they are becoming very popular that there is a growing need and desire for them out there in the community.

We are hoping to start a Footermuff –making group or even groups. Not only will this result in providing some residents in local care-homes with a new tool to make them calmer and less anxious, it will also provide a fellowship for the members of the congregation (male and female), old and young, knitters of great or little experience. As you can see from the picture, the basic stitch is stocking stitch. What could be simpler? A cuppa and cake could be provided also! So go in the attic and find those needles, wool and bits and bobs! If you don't have wool or needles don't worry come along and we will provide some.


