## One Family - One for All



One of the highlights that I always look forward to in the year is my annual pilgrimage to Spring Harvest. Fiona and I have been attending this spring conference for many years.

Even before we became a couple Spring Harvest was part of our lives. At one time there was a Scottish Spring Harvest held at the Butlins Camp in Ayr but in the past few years we have had to choose between the Minehead or Skegness events.

This years theme focused in on Chapter 17 of the Gospel of John and encouraged us to think about "Unity" and being "One Family". Remarkably on the very night before Jesus dies he prays a very specific prayer. In fact you could actually argue that this is Jesus' beating heart, the real Lord's Prayer.

*My prayer is not for them alone. I pray also for those who will believe in me through their message, that all of them may be one, Father, just as you are in me and I am in you. May they also be in us so that the world may believe that you have sent me. I have given them the glory that you gave me, that they may be one as we are one; I in them and you in me, so that they may be brought to complete unity. Then the world will know that you sent me and have loved them even as you have loved me.*

*John 17:20-23*

Around the world it feels as though unity is at threat more than ever and especially Church Unity. With fundamentalists and liberals pulling at either end of the scale, have we forgotten everything that binds us together? Are we focusing too much on the things that could pull us apart rather than seeking the One who unites? The One who dies, One for All.

Against a backdrop of political instability, nations dividing, bombs exploding and tensions rising we need to remember that unity looks like something – it's not an abstract term. It's an outstretched hand making up for past grievances. It's a group of people sitting in a room forgetting their differences and sharing their dreams and purposes. It's stopping to chat to a homeless man, not worried about what others think. It's asking someone with opposing beliefs why they believe what they believe, without immediately wanting to deconstruct their worldview or tell them off because they hold to something that we deem to be right or wrong.

Living in Unity, working as a family is about Baptists, Anglicans, Pentecostals, Presbyterians even down to individual congregations and churches like St Mary's and St Leonard's combining for the common goal of bringing the gospel to our communities. Serving together, supporting one another, seeking the common good of the Gospel.

We are one family, brothers and sisters together. It starts from where we are with those we are already linked with. So let us focus on the One who died for us, sacrificed himself for us, and for all of us. He longs and prays that we might know unity, know that we are part of God's family living in a relationship of love with one another and with God, Father, Son and Spirit. Why? So that the world might see our witness, our unity, our love and come to believe in Jesus.

The Psalmist writes:

*"How good and pleasant it is when God's people live together in unity!  
It is like precious oil poured on the head, running down on the beard,  
running down on Aaron's beard, down on the collar of his robe.  
It is as if the dew of Hermon were falling on Mount Zion.  
For there the Lord bestows his blessing, even life forevermore"*

*(Ps. 133:1-3)*

I personally long and pray for us, the people of St Mary's and St Leonard's where we are to make a fresh start, a new commitment, to seek what is good and pleasant, to seek God's blessing being bestowed upon our brothers and sisters, upon us as we seek to work and live in unity with one another.

Where do we begin? Initially I call each of us to prayer and to reflect upon the Easter story once again. At the foot of the cross you will find that we all stand on common ground, we are all as equals before Christ's cross and His throne. We, all of us, are the guilty ones who are loved and set free by the One who hangs on the tree. That is our starting point, to acknowledge that we are one, not in our differences, but in the One who loves us and calls us to love one another above all things. So, that in our love for One who loves us we come to live in unity and in love for the ones besides us in His name.

And this is only the beginning! So let us pray for a unity of Love in Christ.

### **Nejebbar's Story - Just one of many**

Nejebbar fled Afghanistan with her family after the Taliban threatened to kill her husband, Noor, who was a teacher. It wasn't an idle threat - the Taliban first blinded, then murdered, another member of their family. 'The last days and weeks in Afghanistan were the hardest,' says Noor. 'When I went to work, my heart was beating harder. I didn't know if my family were going to be alive when I got back.'

### **Nejebbar's family are stuck in Greece**

When the family arrived at the refugee camp in Greece, they thought they would only stay for 10 days. But they've been there six months now and there's no end in sight. The only protection they have against the wind and rain is their tent. There's no school for their children. Five-year-old Sudai, their youngest, is ill, but Nejebbar and Noor don't know what's wrong with him because they can't communicate with the camp's doctor, who is Greek.

### **Nejebbar's hope for the future**

Nejebbar is the rock at the centre of her family throughout all this uncertainty. She has even welcomed Faraidoon and Farzad into the family, two brothers who don't know where their parents are, or if they're even alive. 'We still have some hope for our children's future,' says Nejebbar. 'We only want a peaceful life. We want our children to go to school. The most important thing is our children.'

## **SPRING HARVEST 2017 - A reflection from Vicki Clark**

My Mum, Alison (Bruce) and her grand-daughter, Megan, and I went to Skegness for Spring Harvest 2017. We had hoped to go to Minehead but it was fully booked and so, we and the Harris family and their friends, the Morans, had to settle for Skegness in Holy Week.

Alison had never driven as far as Lincolnshire before and was a little apprehensive but drove brilliantly and our thanks to her. Skegness in Lincolnshire is on the sea as are all Butlins camps and our shared flat was cosy and had everything we wanted once we figured out how the shower worked! We were blessed with lovely weather – the sun shone for two of the days, and we had only a morning of drizzle.

The theme of the week was Unity and John 17 was chosen as the reading and referenced throughout the week. Our mornings started with an all age celebration, then the children went to their sessions and the adults chose theirs. There was a programme of parallel streams to suit all ages. I personally went to the Bible teaching classes and another on healing. I also attended two on how to engage children (with my Messy Church hat on). My Mum enjoyed the “Tale of the Fishermen” which was a musical of the life of Jesus told through the fishermen Peter, Andrew, James and John and a concert by Jonathan Veira who sang both pop and Christian songs. But the highlight of every evening was the noisy but amazing sessions in the Big Top where we sang our hearts out, listened to inspirational talks and shed a few tears too! as we explored what it means to be in Unity as one family.

The Unity theme can be applied nationally and locally. While we cannot influence national leaders on ecumenical matters we can certainly try to have more interdenominational activities locally. We used to have ecumenical Lent groups. So perhaps we could resurrect these again. Peter will discuss this with the local clergy! We can also display unity within our own two churches by listening and accepting others’ opinions and not be blinkered and uncompromising with our own. We should not bulldoze others into submission. At times we need to “agree generously to disagree” but seek to work together for Christ Jesus and the Gospel.

Unfortunately Alison developed a cold and could not get to many sessions but Megan had a ball and wants to live at Skegness! I think the fun fair might have something to do with this decision. Mum has already asked when the next Spring harvest is as she wants to book already and so she should as places are going fast. We are hoping to take a bigger group next year and I would encourage anyone wishing to deepen their faith and have fun to join us if they can.



Our net meeting is on Friday 26th May when we shall gather at The Melville Inn @ Dobbies for a meal at 6.30pm.


### **The next book will be Birdcage Walk by Helen Dunmore**



## Specific things to pray for this month

Pray for all who are preparing to be confirmed or affirm their faith on May 21<sup>st</sup> that they will be blessed and enriched as they undertake this part of their spiritual journey. Ask God to bless our ongoing adventures of Messy Church, Cafe Church and the Footermuff Group. Ask him to show us how we can use these ways of worship to honour him, to grow in spirituality and in the ways we reach out into the communities in which we live. Ask his blessing on our regular Sunday worship.


