Prayer

Reading Hear the reading of Luke 2: 22-38

When the time came for the purification rites required by the Law of Moses, Joseph and Mary took Jesus to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord (as it is written in the Law of the Lord, 'Every firstborn male is to be consecrated to the Lord), there they offered a sacrifice in keeping with the Law: 'a pair of doves or two young pigeons'.

Now there was a man in Jerusalem called Simeon, who was righteous and devout. It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not die before he had seen the Lord's Messiah. Moved by the Spirit, he went into the temple courts. When the parents brought in the child Jesus to do for him what the custom of the Law required, Simeon took him in his arms and praised God, saying:

'Sovereign Lord, as you have promised, you may now dismiss your servant in peace. For my eyes have seen your salvation, which you have prepared in the sight of all nations: a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and the glory of your people Israel.'

The child's father and mother marvelled at what was said about him. Then Simeon blessed them and said to Mary, 'This child is destined to cause the falling and rising of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be spoken against, so that the thoughts of many hearts will be revealed. And a sword will pierce your own soul too.'

There was also a prophet, Anna. She was very old; having had lived with her husband seven years after her marriage, and then was a widow until she was eighty-four. She never left the temple but worshipped night and day, fasting and praying. Coming up to them at that very moment, she gave thanks to God and spoke about the child to all who were looking forward to the redemption of Jerusalem.

Table Discussion

Candlemas celebrates the coming of Jesus as the light to the Gentiles and the glory of Israel. Even today we continue to use candles to represent the light of Christ guiding us and conquering the darkness around us.

Take time around your tables to consider and discuss the following:

What and where are the dark places in our world that need light?

What are the dark places in our own community?

What activities and events are bringing light to our neighbourhoods?

How can you share the light of God?

In your own life where do you need the Light of Christ to help you?

Using the post-it notes write your responses and then place them on the picture of the large candle. These will be used to help guide our prayers of intercessions

Table Activity

Using the resources on your table make your own candle for you to use at the close of the service and to take home as a symbol of you carrying the light of God in to your home and community.

Eucharistic Prayer

The warmth and splendour of the light of love draws us to this table where we remember that we are loved, accepted and forgiven.

The Lord is here **His Spirit is with us.**Lift up your hearts.

We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

It is right to give him thanks and praise.

Worship and praise belong to you, O Lord. In the beginning You said let there be light, and created the heavens and established the earth; you sustain in being all that is.

Although we turned away from you and walked in the ways of darkness you gave your Son, the Light of the world to us and by your Holy Spirit you call us to new birth in a creation restored by love to walk with you again.

As children of your redeeming purpose we offer you our praise with angels and archangels and the whole company of heaven, singing the hymn of your unending glory:

Holy, Holy, Holy Lord, God of power and might. Heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest. Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

Glory and thanksgiving be to you, most loving Father, for the gift of your Son born in human flesh.

He is the Word existing beyond time, both source and final purpose, bringing to wholeness all that is made.

Obedient to your will he died upon the Cross.

By your power you raised him from the dead.

He broke the bonds of evil and set your people free to be his Body in the world.

On the night when he was given up to death, knowing that his hour had come, having loved his own, he loved them to the end.

At supper with his disciples he took bread and offered you thanks. He broke the bread, and gave it to them, saying: 'Take, eat. This is my Body: it is broken for you.'

After supper, he took the cup, he offered you thanks, and gave it to them saying: 'Drink this, all of you. This is my Blood of the new covenant; it is poured out for you, and for all, that sins may be forgiven. Do this in remembrance of me.'

We now obey your Son's command.
We recall his blessed passion and death,
his glorious resurrection and ascension;
and we look for the coming of his Kingdom.
Made one with him, we offer you these gifts
and with them ourselves, a single, holy, living sacrifice.

Hear us, most merciful Father, and send your Holy Spirit upon us and upon this bread and this wine, that, overshadowed by his life-giving power, they may be the Body and Blood of your Son, and we may be kindled with the fire of your love and renewed for the service of your Kingdom.

Help us, who are baptised into the fellowship of Christ's Body to live and work to your praise and glory; may we grow together in unity and love until at last, in your new creation, we enter into our heritage in the company of the Virgin Mary, the apostles and prophets, and of all our brothers and sisters living and departed.

Through Jesus Christ our Lord, with whom, and in whom, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory be to you, Lord of all ages, world without end. Amen.

NEWS about THE RAICHEVS, OUR UKRAINIAN FAMILY

Many of you will be wondering how things are going with the Raichevs. They arrived in Scotland from Odessa in July and were staying at the Holiday Inn in Corstorphine while they were being matched with a host family.

They came to Midlothian in early November and stayed with us Clarks until the weekend before Christmas. Richard and I were understandably apprehensive prior to this as we were opening our home to complete strangers, plus we had heard mixed reports from other hosts when we went to host meetings. But God was with us and it turned out to be a wonderful experience. The family, which consisted of Tetiana (Tanya), Hennadii, Misha and Alina, were a joy to have and they filled our days with much laughter, school runs and food sharing.

The children have been attending King's Park School and enjoy it, slowly learning the language. Tanya goes to language classes in Edinburgh several times a week and is about to embark on a care home course which hopefully will lead to a job. Hennadii is also trying to improve his English and is trying to find voluntary work.

We found a 2-bed flat for them (and in view of the lack of rents in the area were very lucky). It could not have been more convenient for the Job Centre or the school, and while there have been the usual teething problems with flats (e.g. dealing with the energy company!), they seem to be settling in well. Richard and I continue to support the family as they have a few other issues to sort out, including navigating the NHS and Scottish Gas, but things are progressing well. We take them out to the park occasionally and before Christmas to the Christmas markets and ice skating, and they joined us for our Christmas meal at Broomieknowe Golf Club as well as at St. Mary's for Christingle. They are extremely grateful for the support the church has given them. As you are aware, many of you have contributed to the rent for their flat and they were overwhelmed with all the domestic items you have donated – the duvets, sheets, towels, iron, hoover, dishes from Betty Tinley, TV, desks and even a Christmas tree!

We pray that they continue their journey towards independence here in Scotland and perhaps even returning to their homeland one day!


